

The Conference Background

The Association of Black Administrators at the Massachusetts Institute of Technology is hosting a three-day national conference on issues concerning black administrators on predominantly white campuses from June 24 to June 27 1982 on MITs campus in Cambridge, Massachusetts.

Black professional administrators have become aware that no public forum currently exists to address common issues that are unique to the black administrator at a largely white college or university. Among these concerns are upward mobility, interaction with white and black colleagues, professional training, dealing with stress, broadening career alternatives, supervising white staff members, being responsive to the needs of black students, building networks with peers at other institutions, developing effective black faculty/staff organizations on campus, and interaction with predominantly black institutions.

Focus

The conference will have as its focus the black administrator and his/her personal and professional development and concerns as opposed to highlighting the duties. responsibilities, and functions of a college administrator. College administrators from all types of institutions are invited to the conference (e.g., public, private, single-sex, community colleges, etc.) as well as all levels of administrators (neophytes to college presidents), faculty members, trustee

members, and anyone else interested in the issues that face black administrators on white campuses

White professional administrators as well as other interested persons are encouraged to attend and participate in the conference.

Goals

- a) To provide a forum for nationally acclaimed researchers, scholars and policy makers to address common issues that are unique to black administrators at predominantly white colleges and universities;
- b) To build professional and communicative networks with peers at other institutions;
- c) To assist black administrators in career development;
- d) To consider the possibility of a national black administrators professional association growing out of the conference:
- e) To publish the proceedings of the conference.

A prominent national figure will speak at the banquet on June 26. After the banquet, there will be a dance and live entertainment by the recording group called "Margo Thunder and Intrigue.

Dining

A continental breakfast of coffee, tea, and danish pastries will be provided for participants staying in the MIT dormitories. The cost of the continental breakfast is included in the housing fee. A larger breakfast selection is available in the MIT Student Center Cafeteria which is nearby at your own expense.

Costs for Thursday dinner, Friday luncheon, Saturday buffet luncheon, and Saturday Banquet are included in the "total package" registration fee. Meal tickets for spouses or guests will be available during the conference and can be purchased up to 24 hours before each meal. For those conference meals that include a guest speaker the price of the meal will be considerably higher than it would be in the "total package" plan.

Conference participants may use the MIT Student Center Cafeteria for breakfast and dinner meals only at their own expense or they are free to enjoy the wide variety of restaurants that Boston and Cambridge have to offer.

Transportation

The Boston airport is about six miles from the MIT campus. Taxi fare to the campus is about \$12.00 regardless of the number of passengers. A single traveler can make the trip using the Share-A-Cab service for \$6.15. The trip by subway costs \$1.00 but involves a subway transfer and a bus ride at each end of the trip.

Restaurants and other conveniences in the Cambridge and Boston area are easily reached by taxi, bus, or subway from the conference site. Parking on the MIT campus is limited: however, a small number of on-campus parking spaces are available. If you need an on-campus space, please indicate this on your registration card and the proper identification will be sent to you. These requests will be filled on a firstcome, first-served basis.

Registration

Registration can be cancelled with a full refund up to three weeks before the conference.

Boston and Cambridge

Boston and Cambridge offer many cultural attractions. In addition to the Museum of Fine Arts there are numerous other art galleries, theaters, conservatories, and a wide variety of museums.

Boston is a melting pot of different ethnic groups. There are about 2,000 eating and drinking establishments – there are dozens of different varieties of food including Boston's famous seafood.

MIT is one of more than 50 schools located within the Boston area. Others include Harvard University, Radcliffe College, Boston University, Boston College. Brandeis University, Tufts University, Simmons College, Wellesley College, and many specialized professional art and music schools. The concentration of academic, cultural and intellectual activities in the Boston area is one of the largest in the country.

The Boston and Cambridge areas are compact enough to see much of them on foot. There are many posted walking trails; the Freedom Trail in downtown Boston and the Heritage Trail in Cambridge are two of the most historic. The harbor, the battle sites, statues, markers, trails, and monuments are all everyday evidence of the role that Boston played in America's growth.

For those wishing to travel after the conference, Cape Cod lies to the south, the Maine coast to the northeast, the White Mountains to the north, and the Berkshires to the west.

Accommodations

Conference participants may stay in dormitory rooms on the MIT campus or in nearby hotels. The dormitory rates are \$29.00 for a single and \$20.00 per person for a double (per night). The price includes a continental breakfast. MIT dormitories are elevator equipped, but they do not have private baths or air-conditioning. Children between the ages of 6 and 14 may be accommodated in the same room with their parents at an additional charge of \$6.00 per night (which provides a cot and continental breakfast). Children under the age of 6 may not be housed in the dormitories. Children over the age of 14 must be housed in a single room. Each room is supplied with towels, soap and linen. Beds are made each day.

If you want a campus room, please fill out the housing request and enclose it with your registration card.

Accommodations are available at the following hotels at special conference rates. Reservations should be made directly with the hotel; a first night's deposit is required to guarantee the reservation. Only a limited number of rooms are available and reservations at conference rates may be secured until May 26, 1982. Please mention the name of conference when making the reservation.
