

Report to the President, Year Ended June 30, 2024, School of Humanities, Arts, and Social Sciences

Intro

The School of Humanities, Arts, and Social Sciences (SHASS), the third-largest school at MIT (after Engineering and Science), employs a teaching faculty comparable in size to that of most liberal arts colleges and plays a number of important roles at MIT.

Among other functions, the school:

- Offers 20 undergraduate major programs and 30 undergraduate minor programs
- Engages undergraduate students and graduate students each year in Anthropology; Comparative Media Studies; Economics; Global Languages; History; Linguistics; Literature; Music; Philosophy; Political Science; Science, Technology, and Society (STS); Theater Arts; Women's and Gender Studies; and Writing
- Supports five doctoral programs: Economics, Linguistics, Philosophy, Political Science, and History, Anthropology, and Science, Technology, and Society (HASTS)
- Supports four master's programs: Data, Economics, and Design of Policy, the MIT Indigenous Language Initiative in MIT Linguistics, Political Science, and Science Writing.
- Provides subjects toward the undergraduate Humanities, Arts, and Social Sciences (HASS) requirement, an eight-class portion of the General Institute Requirement (GIR)
- Hosts more than 30 labs, centers, and programs, including the Abdul Latif Jameel Poverty Action Lab (J-PAL), the Center for International Studies, and the Knight Science Journalism Program.
- Operates the MIT International Science and Technology Initiatives (MISTI), MIT's pioneering international education program, which matches students with internship, teaching, and research opportunities abroad.

Faculty and staff

MIT Linguistics was ranked first in its subject area by 2023 QS World University Rankings; MIT Economics ranked second in its subject area.

New Initiatives and Programs

SHASS Programming Initiative Report

During the course of the 2023-24 year, a committee chaired by Associated Dean Keeril Makan was charged with exploring priorities for a humanities initiative in SHASS. After several months of research, surveying peer institutions, and gathering input from SHASS, the committee produced the [SHASS Programming Initiative Report](#) in May 2024.

The report included four short-term recommendations to the Dean:

- Create an internal faculty fellows program
- Hire additional staff in the Dean's Office to support interdisciplinary programs
- Reassess funding categories for Dean's grants
- Create opportunities for the community to gather

There were additional longer-term recommendations made, as well:

- Create a proposal for an Institute-wide Humanities Center
- Assess space needs for SHASS
- Identify philanthropic and foundation support

Shaping the Future of Work

The MIT Shaping the Future of Work Initiative, co-directed by MIT professors Daron Acemoglu, David Autor, and Simon Johnson, celebrated its official launch in January. The new initiative's mission is to analyze the forces that are eroding job quality and labor market opportunities for non-college workers and identify innovative ways to move the economy onto a more equitable trajectory.

Global Diversity Lab

In June and July of 2023, the Global Diversity Lab (GDL) in the Department of Political Science hosted its first GDL Summer Research Program. Pathways@GDL is aimed at broadening the pipeline into U.S. political science PhD programs. Four current undergraduates from U.S. universities and two current master's students at African universities mixed research assistant work and their own independent research projects, professionalizing their presentation of research and exchanging information with each other and Department of Political Science faculty. We spoke with associate professors Noah Nathan and Ariel White, who coordinate the program.

Civil Discourse in the Classroom and Beyond

Civil Discourse in the Classroom and Beyond launched in the Fall of 2023. It includes a speaker series and curricular activities in MIT's Concourse program for first-year students. MIT philosophers Alex Byrne and Brad Skow from the Department of Linguistics and Philosophy lead the project, in close coordination with Anne McCants, professor of history and director of Concourse, and Linda Rabieh, a Concourse lecturer.

The Arthur Vining Davis Foundations provided a substantial grant to help fund the project. Promoting civil discourse on college campuses is an area of focus for AVDF — they sponsor related projects at many schools, including Duke University and Davidson College.

Economics predoctoral fellowship program

The MIT Department of Economics launched a new program that pairs faculty with predoctoral fellows. The new predoc program is made possible by an ongoing major fundraising initiative in the department. Once the program is fully launched, it will include up to 24 predocs working for economics faculty at MIT.

Global MIT At-Risk Fellows

The Global MIT At-Risk Fellows (GMAF) Program launched in the Fall of 2023. It is designed to enhance the educational and research experiences of Ukrainian university faculty and researchers by

introducing them to MIT campus methods and strategies in their areas of specialty. This pilot program focuses on Ukrainian scholars with current or recent affiliations at Ukrainian universities or the Ukrainian Academy of Sciences. The applicants may currently be residing in Ukraine (with eligibility to leave the country) or be living outside the country since the full-scale invasion of Ukraine in February 2022.

Knight Science Journalism Program

The Knight Science Journalism (KSJ) Program at MIT announced a new fellowship program that will provide students from historically Black colleges and universities (HBCU) with training, mentorship, and early-career support to report on science, health, and environmental issues. The fellowship's inaugural cohort will consist of 10 highly accomplished journalism students representing Florida A&M University, Hampton University, Howard University, Morgan State University, and North Carolina A&T State University.

In addition, KSJ announced a new one-semester fellowship — the Fellowship for Advancing Science Journalism in Africa and the Middle East. The fellowship, developed through a generous gift from the global publishing company Springer Nature, was created in honor of the influential Egyptian science journalist Mohammed Yahia, who died last year at the age of 41.

Data, Economics, and Design of Policy master's program expands

MIT's Abdul Latif Jameel Poverty Action Lab (J-PAL) and Department of Economics announced an expansion of their jointly administered Master of Applied Science in Data, Economics, and Design of Policy (DEDP) program. This expansion adds a new public policy track to complement the existing international development track, opening up new avenues for student learning and research.

Designed to tackle poverty alleviation and other pressing policy challenges in the United States and other high-income countries, the curriculum of the new track spans a diverse set of issues, from domestic concerns like minimum wage and consumer welfare to global matters including trade, climate change, and immigration. Applications for the public policy track will open this fall, with the inaugural cohort set to arrive on MIT's campus in spring 2026.

Diversity

Community engagement and events

The Dean's Office organized a new event in December 2023: Spring Ahead with SHASS. This was targeted to undergrads a way to give a preview of Spring 2024 subject offerings. Academic Administrator Chanh Phan coordinated with the UAAs to organize and facilitate the event.

In February 2024, the Dean's Office worked with UAAs to host a SHASS Trivia Night for students majoring in SHASS as a way to help build community.

In Fall 2023, the de Florez Fund for Humor hosted a performance by comedian Michelle Wolf.

In Spring 2024, the de Florez Fund for Humor hosted a performance by comedian Drew Lynch.

Development

In FY2023, new gifts and pledges to the School totaled \$152,058,053.23.

Some highlights include: a \$45M endowed gift from the Stanton Foundation to create the Center for Nuclear Security Policy in the Center for International Studies; an eight-figure expendable gift to support research in the Abdul Latif Jameel Poverty Action Lab, North America; several 7-figure gifts from individual donors in the Department of Economics, including two gifts to endow two faculty chairs; two seven-figure gifts from individual donors to help launch the MIT Human Insight Collaborative (MITHIC); and significant six-figure gifts to support programming in the Music and Theater Arts Section.
